THE COLORADO RURAL HEALTH CENTER BRINGS REGIONAL CONFERENCE TO FORT MORGAN

A 501(c)(3) nonprofit, the Colorado Rural Health Center is the State Office of Rural Health

Aurora, Colorado -- The Colorado Rural Health Center (CRHC) is bringing one of its four regional conferences to Fort Morgan, Colorado on June 25-26, as part of its annual conference schedule for 2009. “We have an exciting conference format this year and look forward to increased attendance and outreach at the northeastern Colorado conference in Fort Morgan,” said Lou Ann Wilroy, Executive Director of CRHC. The conference’s various events will be held at Morgan Community College, Colorado Plains Medical Center, and a reception will be held at Rocco’s Grotto. The other three rural communities around the state that will host the remaining CRHC regional conferences in 2009 are Alamosa, Glenwood Springs, and Rocky Ford. Sponsors of the Fort Morgan event include Colorado Plains Medical Center, Colorado Health Institute, COPIC Companies, Area Health Education Center (AHEC), Centura Health—Porter Hospital, HealthONE Outreach Services, AARP, The Colorado Trust, and the Colorado Hospital Association.

Using the responses from a statewide membership survey, CRHC tailored the Fort Morgan conference to the needs of the surrounding region. The keynote speaker will be best-selling author T.R. Reid, National Public Radio correspondent, who will present “The Healing of America—A Global Quest for Better, Cheaper and Fairer Health Care.” Reid is one of the nation’s best known correspondents through his coverage of global affairs and documentaries. Additional conference topics include “Provider Recruitment and Retention,” “Access to Care,” and “Rural Mental Health”, and speakers will offer up-to-date information and tangible solutions to these pressing issues. The conferences will also provide participants from a variety of healthcare sectors with resources and networking opportunities.

Each conference will consist of an optional grant-writing workshop and health information class, an optional quality improvement workshop for Critical Access Hospitals, an evening welcome reception, and a full day of conference sessions. In order to reach as many people as possible, minimal registration fees will be charged. “We purposely schedule our conferences so participants can enjoy some rural hospitality and local events while attending,”

explained Wilroy. “In this case, our attendees will have a chance to stay over and enjoy Glenn Miller Days!”

The Colorado Rural Health Center was established in 1991 as the first nonprofit State Office of Rural Health in the U.S. Although every state has an office of rural health, CRHC remains one of only three offices of rural health organized as a nonprofit. As a 501(c)(3) nonprofit corporation, CRHC’s mission is “enhancing healthcare services in Colorado by providing information, education, linkages, tools and energy toward addressing rural healthcare issues.” The Colorado Rural Health Center has a statewide constituency of over 3,500 people and organizations.
